National Coastwatch Institution

The NCI is a fantastic organisation which runs watchkeepers around the UK coast to keep a visual watch on water users, monitor radio channels, and provide a listening watch in poor visibility. Watches are kept year round by circa 2700 highly-trained volunteers at 60 stations around the country, and those volunteers come from all walks of life. You must undergo thorough training before becoming a watchman, but all from the top to the bottom volunteer their own time to make this organisation work. A very apt charity for the Inter-Livery Regatta this year given our members and competitors utilise various stretches of the UK coast!

We were joined by Frank Moxon, Trustee National Coastwatch, at our Saturday presentation dinner, who took the time to share a few words with us all about the work of

the NCI and the type of support we all, as water users, can provide. Thank you to Frank for educating us on the NCI's integral involvement in the UK's water safety! Remember, you can call VHF65 to undertake radio checks/check local weather forecasts/obtain local navigation advice with the NCI rather than HM Coastguard.

The Scriveners – Eagle

On 16th May 2026, the Scriveners Company competed for the Lord Mayor's Cup, the oldest cup in inter-livery sport of any type. The regatta consisted of 20 yachts and 3 keelboats and was entered by the Scriveners, the Little Ship Club, the Bar YC, the Innholders, the Gunmakers, the City Livery YC, the Royal Naval Sailing Association, the Information Technologists, the Butchers, the Grocers, the International Bankers, the World Traders, the Educators, Portcullis SC, the Leathersellers, the Constructors, the Barbers and the Broderers.

Eagle flew the burgee of the City Livery YC high in the senior position on the starboard side and a burgee of a fierce pen-toting eagle (denoting the Scriveners) in the more junior position high up port side.

Race 1 began on the RORC line at Cowes, and the yachts beat up to the Gurnard north cardinal mark just off Egypt point before a long-ish run of nearly 2.5 miles out past the Ryde Middle Bank. Due to confusion from the race course instructions, the Scriveners thought the race allowed no spinnakers but some yachts ahead launched theirs on the run and the Scriveners then launched the big heavyweight symmetric spinnaker, causing the boat to charge down the course, past several other competitors. It was very hairy as Eagle is tail-happy and very roly-poly on a run in gusty winds as we had here, the gusts occasionally reaching 22 knots. With twin spinnaker sheets and guys and a 3 times World Champion and Olympic medallist on the foredeck, the Scriveners completed a textbook dip-pole gybe on to starboard with 5 minutes to run to the mark, followed by a fine leeward drop at the mark, under the boom and "letterbox", down the main hatch. Beating up towards the RORC buoy (just south of the Bramble Bank) in a good fresh Force 5, the Scriveners showed a clean pair of heels to various companies and came round the RORC buoy in fine fettle, then charging for the Royal London Bouy at a very good hull speed of up to 7.5 knots. The result later showed that the Scriveners had done well, placed 2nd and

beaten by Kusima (the overall winner of the weekend) by only 45 seconds over a race of more than one hour.

For some reason, the Scriveners' Skipper went to pieces during the build-up to Race 2. Correctly charging for the outer distance mark at the start, the Skipper suddenly decided to go into lemming mode and followed others in the class in a luffing match in totally the wrong direction. Then Reef 1 got stuck in, making the sail area too small, then the Foredeck tried to bite the genoa during a tack, getting hit hard on the nose instead, then leaking blood over the decks. After the very hairy spinnaker action in Race 1, we then decided on a cautious genoa goosewing instead of using any spinnaker in Race 2, losing yet more time, though gaining some back by going very shallow inside the Lepe cardinal mark for less adverse tide round Lepe Point. Coming back with the tide on the beats up to the finish, the Skipper with total brain overload then overstood 2 more marks, losing further seconds and we finished a lowly 8th though with pride intact.

Later, at dinner in the Royal Yacht Squadron, the Admiral of the City Livery YC, former Rt Hon Lord Mayor Prof Mainelli himself an entrant in the regatta, presented the Scriveners with the Sir Robert Green Trophy, for 2nd place in our class in Race 1.

On Saturday evening, the presentation dinner for the Lord Mayor's Cup held at Royal Yacht Squadron, with wonderful views over the water, allowed us to mingle with other Livery Company crews to share our racing experiences. A good weekend was had by all.

The Constructors – Sonar

Thursday 14th May 2026

We had decided to make it an extended weekend break in Cowes and be prepared for the CLYC Regatta on Saturday. With my eldest son Matt, we took a leisurely drive down from London to Hamble where fellow Crew and friend, Cara Golden, lives. We then took her Hardy 20, a comfortable motor boat with an 80HP outboard that delivers 15kn to 20kn on the plane, over to Cowes. We visited the Island Sailing Club (ISC) to familiarise ourselves and book a training sail for the next day, my younger son, Ben, came down from London just in time for curry and a beer. What fun and such a great start to the weekend.

Friday 15th May 2026

Now fully in relaxed Regatta spirit, we looked at tides and weather and did a bit of prep for Saturday. Had a lovely bacon sandwich for Brunch and then set off to ISC. After kitting us out with safety gear, life jacket, and radio, we had a safety brief and Andy took us out to the moorings to meet our Sonar for the weekend, "MISCREANT". None of us had sailed a Sonar before, so we wanted to fully familiarise ourselves on boat set up and boat handling.

We did a number of beats and runs and we all slotted into our positions. Matt on helm, Ben on Main, Cara front of boat and tactics, and me in the middle of the boat. In the couple of hours we trained the wind built and then started to die - seemed like this was likely to be the same on Saturday although more wind was forecast. Tuned the rig and felt good with our spinnaker hoists and gybes. Prep done.

We were then off the water to have a debrief in the Bar, a couple of beers and then home to get ready for the CLYC Welcome event at the RORC Club. It was good to meet fellow sailors, enjoy the buffet, and a few more beers.

Saturday 16th May 2026

There was a regatta briefing from the Race Officer down at Cowes Yacht Haven at 9am, and hopefully a few tips on the course. The plan was 2 races starting off the RORC Line,

playing in the Central Solent Area. Perfect. Our 1st Start was 11.20hrs. Plan was to get down to the ISC around 10am to get the boat rigged and ready to go.

We dropped mooring and straight away got into race mode, rigging for Port rounds, and then watching the previous starts for line position and bias... Ohh the course comes over the Whatsapp and its Starboard rounds! Short course, 3 marks and perfect with a beat, spinnaker run and shy reach to the finish. Reset the boat for Starboard rounds and settled into the Start.

Race 1 11.20hrs - Ben handled the countdown whilst Matt jockeyed the boat for a mid-line but closest to pin start, a great start and we were off! Leward of our competitors but in front. Round 1st mark, popped up the kite and off we go to 2nd mark not looking back. Good drop round the mark and shy reach to finish. Competitors a long way back - that preparation paid off!

Race 2 13.05hrs - Slightly longer race and the wind was building. Same format; 3 marks, Starboard rounds. Tactic was to take the pin and go for it. It was a free and quick start with competitors inside and to windward. We had to make a choice nearing the 1st mark; take a boat up but end up down tide of the mark, or let them pass and round 1st. We chose to let them round just in front and then hoist our spinnaker. As we hoisted, the wind increased and flicked right so we were on a reach. We were moving fast and soon won back the lead. Half way along the leg, the wind went further right so we dropped the kite and tightened up towards the 3rd mark. After a tight battle, we rounded the 3rd mark just in front, with a white sail reach to the finish.

Just as our competitor rounded the mark, our mainsheet broke off the boom! Disaster!! Quick thinking was required so I grabbed the end of the main sheet, did a quick loop over the end of boom, and recovered the main in towards the boat centre. With a quick loop around the traveller, we fashioned a jury rig to tie the main sail in position. Whilst this was going on Matt and Cara sailed the boat onward and fortunately managed to maintain our route to the finish without being overtaken - winning by 30secs in a 54minute race.

Phew! 2 Races 2 wins for the Constructors with a bit of action and great team work. It was a very enjoyable day on the water, and we had a trophy to collect at the Royal Yacht Squadron! Super dinner, great company and a very enjoyable evening. Regatta well organised and great fun.

The Constructors will be back next year to return the trophy and either fight to maintain our win, or possibly compete in the bigger boat class. The Sonars are such a fun, easy to sail dayboat!

We enlisted the assistance of Cally, a good friend to assist as crew, who was a “New to the boat” crew member, we embarked on our race adventure and the City Livery regatta!
